New CEO Appointed at Cambridge Resthaven Community Trust

Cambridge's community-owned retirement village and aged care provider, Cambridge Resthaven, has appointed Michael Martin as the new CEO, effective 1 December.

Mr Martin has been based in Auckland for some time but has long intended to return to the regions. He grew up on a dairy farm in Taranaki, has previously worked in Hamilton, and is looking forward to relocating to Cambridge.
